
There were five intrepid walkers, including Jean, Lynne and Sarah, who were in training for their sponsored Breast Cancer Ribbon Walk.

FRUIT AND NUT BAKED **APPLES**

Serves 2

2 cooking apples 25 g (1 oz) raisins 1 tablespoon flaked almonds 2 teaspoons maple syrup pinch of ground cinnamon 1 teaspoon low fat spread

Preheat the oven to Gas Mark 5. 190C, 375F. Line a roasting tin with non-stick baking parchment.

Wash and core the apples. Arrange in tin

Mix together raisins, the almonds, maple syrup and cinnamon and pack equal amounts into each apple. Dot the top of each with a little low fat spread and bake for 20-25 minutes, until the apples are soft and pulpy. Serve warm.
