# **Our School of Excellence**

We are delighted to be able to report that following our Ofsted Inspection last year, Hornton School has been recognised by Ofsted's Chief Inspector, Chris Woodhead, as one of only 2 schools in Oxfordshire for providing good quality education and achieving high standards. (The other school is Combe near Witney). Our school name will be published in the official national annual report for 1995/96, as a centre of excellence.

Naturally we are immensely proud of this accolade, particularly since it has come about through the rigorous process of an Ofsted Inspection. A big thank you to all children, staff, parents, voluntary helpers and governors for making this possible. Hornton School has been "put on the map" and we all strive to maintain the high standards.

## HORNTON SCHOOL NEWS

Our Christmas Concert, held in the Methodist Chapel, with the theme "Christmas Around the World" went successfully. The retiring collection raised £107.86 which was sent to the NSPCC.

In November the children raised £590 through a sponsored spell and tables test. The money is being spent on books for our new library, which we hope to establish for next September. The children are involved in selecting suitable books.

l tbsp: Wholegrain Mustard


14 oz. can Tomatoes

### RED LENTIL & VEGETABLE CURRY

4 tsps oil

1 large onion

2 cloves garlic, finely chopped

2 carrots, diced

2 sticks celery, diced

4 tsps curry powder

1 large (450g) can chopped tomatoes

8 oz split red lentils

1 pint vegetable stock

lemon juice

Seasoning as desired

Heat the oil in a large saucepan and stirfry the onion and garlic for 3 minutes. Add the carrot and celery, stir then add the curry powder. Stir in the tomatoes, lentils and stock and bring to the boil over a moderate heat. Cover the saucepan, reduce the heat and simmer for 20-25 minutes, stirring occasionally. If necessary add a little more stock.

Stir in a little lemon juice just before serving.

Serve with boiled rice, pasta or with pitta bread.


